Dear ASLD Community Members,



# COMMUNITY

## SOLSTICE GARDEN

During the summer of 2021, ASLD's courtyard was filled with artwork inspired by the summer solstice for *Solstice Garden*. Community members of all ages brought unique artwork to the outdoor exhibit, from giant metal sculptures to mini "fairy houses."





## SUNDAY SUNDAE

In July 2021 we hosted our inaugural Sunday Sundae ice cream bowl event. Over 100 ASLD community





members came together to select a handmade bowl from ASLD artists, fill it with Sweet Action ice cream, and enjoy an afternoon in our garden. All proceeds from the event benefited our arts programming.









## SUMMER ART MARKET

ASLD hosted the 28th annual Summer Art Market on August 28 & 29, 2021 (after pandemic conditions forced us to cancel the event in 2020). It was a weekend full of summer fun, with almost 100 artist booths, faculty demonstrations, and kidART activities. This year, artists reported their biggest SAM sales ever, which warmed our hearts and reminded us of the importance this event has in the lives of local artists.

# LEARNING

## VISITING ARTIST Series

For 20 years, ASLD's Visiting Artist Series has provided members the opportunity to learn from and connect with nationally and internationally recognized artists. We bring 4-6 visiting artists to Denver each year to host programming including lectures, workshops, exhibits and community engagement collaborations. This program is made possible by funding from generous partners like the Olson-Vander Heyden Foundation.





During the fall of 2020, Visiting Artist Gregg Deal created an installation in the courtyard of ASLD that included a full-size tipi, furnished on the inside with art, books and items exploring the notion of modern indigenous identity and the impact of the white gaze. Deal and artist JayCee Beyale decorated the outside of the tent with graffiti. Deal also led a workshop on art and activism, and used the installation as part of <u>a performance piece</u>.

### ATELIER



The ASLD Atelier program brings Colorado artists to ASLD for weekend workshops. These workshops serve to supplement ASLD's regular programming, and are often an opportunity to gauge the interest level in a new medium or course before adding it to the ASLD roster on a regular basis.

We employ over 130 local artists as faculty members, in addition to bringing in artists from around the world for our Visiting Artist Series, Atelier program, guest lectures, and other paid opportunities. ASLD believes that creating and teaching art are valuable contributions to any community, which is why we're committed to paying artists fair wages for the work they do. ASLD's status as a <u>W.A.G.E. certified</u> <u>organization</u> verifies this commitment.

# JUSTICE, EQUITY, DIVERISTY, INCLUSION, ACCESSIBILITY (JEDIA) COMMITTEE



After completing a long-term training with consultant Erin Yoshimura (pictured left), this year challenged the ASLD team to find our footing as we continue to center JEDIA in our daily work. Our greatest lesson has been that we are most successfully carrying out our JEDIA values when we are bringing them into everything we do here at ASLD, from workshops and exhibits to fundraising and beyond.

Our JEDIA committee continues to meet regularly and we were especially excited to add several board members to the committee this year.

### GUEST LECTURE

During the winter, ASLD welcomed visiting lecturer Shantay Robinson to give a virtual presentation on three eras of African American art over the course of 100 years. We received very positive feedback on the lecture and enjoyed the opportunity to integrate more art history into our programming.

# YOUTH COURSES SUMMER CAMPS



ASLD offers year-round afterschool and weekend programs for youth ages 6-13, as well as our popular Friday night Teen Studio for ages 14-17. During the summer of 2021, we offered more than 60 summer camps (with options for both inperson and online learning) to more than 400 excited young artists!

### TEEN STUDIO

For the first time in the 6-year history of the program, Teen Studio Night was held online throughout 2020. We're happy to report that the digital format didn't stop our young artists from learning and connecting with peers! More than 512 teens engaged with the program this year, and we saw an increase in teens joining from outside Denver while the program was held virtually.

## ADULT COURSES

Our courses aim to meet each artist where they're at on their creative path. In FY 2020-2021, we offered 639 adult courses in a broad range of media.

## ART FOR WELLBEING

We believe art has the power to transform lives by offering respite in challenging times, providing hope and inspiration, and boosting emotional well-being. According to <u>Americans for the Arts</u>, spending just 30 minutes each day creating art can improve your mental health.

## JOY AND PAIN: A MO(V)EMENT

Art is a tool for self-expression and it helps make meaning of the world around us. This exhibit, curated by Holly-Kai Hurd and Suzi Q. Smith, used visual art and ekphraistic poetry to consider the lived experience of Black Americans following the summer of racial uprisings in 2020. The exhibit exemplified ASLD's practice of offering artists the space to process social issues and represent identity through art.

# INCLUSION

BIG HEART SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

ASLD is committed to providing access to art-making for all artists. We believe financial limitations should never be a barrier to creativity. Each year, we provide youth and adult scholarships to artists in our community. During Fiscal Year 2020-2021, 16 youth scholarship recipients and 43 adult scholarship recipients were awarded a grand total of \$32,000. We appreciate funding from our partners who help make this possible.





# DIVERSITY IN THE ARTS INTERNSHIP A strong arts community is an arts community

A strong arts community is an arts community with leaders that represent the diversity of our Denver community. That's why we're proud to be the fiscal host for the <u>Diversity in the Arts</u> (<u>DITA</u>) internship program. DITA creates paid internship opportunities and fosters a pipeline to leadership in the arts and culture sector for students from traditionally underrepresented communities. 2021 marked the third summer of this program.

## CONNECTING GLOBALLY

In May 2021, ASLD faculty member Adriana Rondón Rivero taught a virtual workshop on healing through art. Presented in partnership with the Biennial of the Americas, this workshop was taught simultaneously in both English and Spanish and included participants from the US, Mexico, and Venezuela.


# FINANCIALS

ASLD finished Fiscal Year 2020-2021 on August 31, 2021 in a cautiously optimistic position. Compared to previous fiscal years prior to the pandemic, we saw a decrease in overall expenses while experiencing an increase in support, thereby resulting in a net surplus. The increase in support was largely due to a variety of COVID-19 relief funds, including government and foundation funds, all of which were one-time only sources of support.




## FY20-21 INCOME
